

Pastor's Corner

Vindication: Hope for the Future, Promise for Today

We talk often about redemption and resurrection—and rightly so. But Scripture offers a companion gift we don't name as frequently: **vindication**. Vindication is God's public "Yes" to those the world has misjudged; it's the moment when the Lord brings hidden faithfulness into the light and declares, "This one is mine." It stands beside redemption as a work of grace and beside resurrection as a sign of victory—hope for the future and promise for the present.

From the opening chapters of Genesis, God hears the cry of the wronged and overlooked—Hagar in the wilderness, Joseph in the prison—and lifts up their stories in ways no human court could have arranged. The psalmists dare to pray, "Vindicate me, O God," trusting that the Lord will not let deceit have the last word. The prophets speak to a shamed people and promise that the One who "vindicates" is near. And then, at the center of the Gospel, **Easter** is not only life from the dead; it is the Father's public reversal of the world's verdict against Jesus. The cross said "guilty"; the empty tomb says "Beloved Son." In Christ, God's vindication breaks into history.

Why does this matter for us, here and now?

- For the misunderstood and misrepresented: Vindication means your quiet faithfulness is not wasted. God sees what others miss and will, in the right time, bring truth into the open. That future confidence steadies present hearts.
- For the weary conscience and the accusing voice (within or without): In Christ, the Judge becomes your Defender. "Who will bring any charge?" asks Paul—not because we've been flawless, but because we belong to the One God has vindicated. The final word over our lives is not shame, but grace.
- For those longing for perfect justice but resisting bitterness: Vindication allows us to entrust outcomes to God. We can do what is right, speak the truth in love, and leave the great unveiling to the Lord who judges with mercy. That frees our hands for service rather than score-keeping.
- For our congregational witness: Vindication invites us to live such open, Christshaped lives that accusations eventually fall flat. Goodness, done quietly and consistently, becomes its own testimony—today in Savannah Lakes Village, across McCormick and Lincoln Counties, and wherever the Lord sends us.

And there is more. Scripture's last word in Revelation is a world set right: the Lamb who was mocked now reigns; the saints who were overlooked are honored; every tear is noticed, named, and wiped away. That **future vindication** does not make us passive; it makes us courageous. Knowing where God is taking history helps us love more boldly in the present. We can keep forgiving, keep serving, keep telling the

truth—even when it costs—because God has promised to bring all things into the light of Christ.

So if you carry a hurt from being misread... if a season of faithful work seems unseen... if you're tempted to build a life around defending your name—hear the good news: **God's got your story.** The One who raised Jesus will also clear the names of those who have taken refuge in him. Redemption says, "You are forgiven and restored." Resurrection says, "You will live." Vindication adds, "You will not live under a lie."

As a church, let's practice that future today:

- **Tell the truth gently.** Refuse rumor; choose charity.
- **Persevere in quiet faithfulness.** Keep showing up in prayer, in care, in small mercies no one applauds.
- **Entrust outcomes to God.** Do the next right thing and let the Lord handle the unveiling.
- **Name grace out loud.** When you see Christ at work in someone, say so. Public encouragement is a small taste of holy vindication.

Friends, this is not wishful thinking; it is the logic of Easter. The Father has already vindicated the Son. Those who are in Christ share his future and his favor. Take heart. What is true in heaven is making its way, slowly and surely, into every hidden place on earth—including ours.

At Lutheran Church By The Lake, we believe that caring for one another is a sacred calling and a joyful gift. Our new Shepherding Care Ministry is dedicated to bringing Lutheran Church to our church family through nurturing spiritual growth and deeper connections within our congregation. Rooted in compassion, encouragement, and faith, this ministry brings together lay leaders and our pastor to serve and support our people through life's joys and challenges.

Our Guiding Principles

Shepherding Care is built on partnership and community. Lay leaders work hand-in-hand with Pastor Greg to create meaningful opportunities for spiritual care. Together, we help each other stay connected to our church family, grow in faith, and experience Christ's love in tangible ways.

- Lay Partnership: Volunteers collaborate closely with the pastor, sharing in care responsibilities and ministry leadership.
- Spiritual Growth: Every act of care is a chance to deepen our faith and share God's love.
- Staying Connected: We bring the love of Christ from the church to those in our midst as we strengthen bonds across our congregation, ensuring no one feels alone.

Our Care Ministries

Shepherding Care is expressed through several caring ministries, each designed to meet specific needs:

- Home Visits: Teams offer friendly visits to members at home, bringing comfort and community.
 When requested, team members bring the Eucharist consecrated by the pastor during the worship service with those unable to attend worship in person.
- Friendly Check-In Calls: Volunteers make regular phone calls to let members know they are remembered, valued, and prayed for.
- Card Ministry: Thoughtful cards are sent for bereavement, celebrations, illnesses, and times of suffering—reminders of God's presence and our congregation's care.
- Prayer Ministry: Prayer warriors are paired with those seeking spiritual support, lifting up requests and concerns in daily prayer.

Pastoral Guidance and Support

Pastor Greg actively guides the Shepherding Care Ministry, providing oversight, encouragement, and accessibility to all members and team leaders. Confidentiality and healthy boundaries are respected, ensuring that our care is both compassionate

and responsible. Team leaders receive ongoing support so that everyone feels equipped and uplifted in service.

What LCBTL Will Do—Starting Now

Please give cash or checks only (made payable to Helping Hands United.

Do not make checks payable to LCBTL—doing so will delay funds reaching our neighbors.

Why Cash (Not Cans) Matters Most

- Stronger buying power: Helping Hands pays no sales tax.
- Wholesale pricing: They purchase in bulk at wholesale, stretching every dollar.
- Right food, right time: They buy exactly what is needed now, avoiding shortages or excesses.
- Efficient & safe: Staff and volunteers can serve clients, not sort and discard expired donations.

Our Commitment

We will continue this cash-only appeal until the shutdown ends and funding is restored, so our neighbors are not forced to choose between food and everything else.


How to Give

A Resolution to Confer the Title Pastor Emeritus upon the Rev. Dr. James Kinsler

WHEREAS, the Rev. Dr. James Kinsler was called to serve as pastor of Lutheran Church By The Lake in 2008 and faithfully shepherded this congregation until his retirement in 2022; and

WHEREAS, at his installation he made solemn vows before God to preach and teach the gospel, to tend the flock with Word and Sacrament, and to lead by example in holy living—and he kept those vows with integrity, just as this congregation pledged to receive him as a messenger of Christ and a steward of the mysteries of God; and

WHEREAS, during his tenure he led with steadiness and hope through defining seasons for church and community alike—including a severe national economic downturn (2008–2009), periods of denominational discernment and public witness that occasioned strong differences of conviction, and the COVID-19 pandemic—guiding our life together in uncharted waters with prayerful judgment and pastoral courage; and

WHEREAS, Pastor Kinsler oversaw significant stewardship of our campus, including the construction of the ARK, the remodeling of portions of the original building, and the creation of a conference room to strengthen our ministries; and

WHEREAS, he initiated and nurtured ministries that continue to bear fruit, notably Camp GRAND, which welcomes grandchildren and children of the wider community into learning, fellowship, fun, and life in the company of Jesus, and he expanded our worship life through lakeside services and blessings for those who take to the water; and

WHEREAS, throughout his pastorate he walked beside the congregation and community in sickness, death, and grief—holding confidences, carrying burdens as his own, and faithfully praying with and for the congregation; and

WHEREAS, he served with a gracious spirit, ready humor, and a playfully self-deprecating manner that never diminished his deep reverence for the office he bore; and

WHEREAS, even after retirement he continued, often quietly and without public recognition, to advise leaders, comfort the anxious, and temper fears with wise counsel; and

WHEREAS, the testimony frequently heard among us remains true: "Pastor Jim loves Jesus," and his life and ministry among us have been a living doxology to the faithfulness of God;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Council of Lutheran Church By The Lake hereby confers upon the Rev. Dr. James Kinsler the honorary title **Pastor Emeritus**, effective **October 26**, **2025**, in grateful recognition of his faithful pastoral service, steadfast leadership through challenge and change, integrity of life, and abiding love for Christ and this congregation; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Council's action be presented to the congregation for joyful affirmation by acclamation at the 10:30 a.m. service, with the President of the Congregation inviting all in favor to rise in thanksgiving; and that the Secretary record both the Council's action and the congregation's acclamation in the permanent minutes of Lutheran Church By The Lake.


Quilt Sale Fundraiser
