

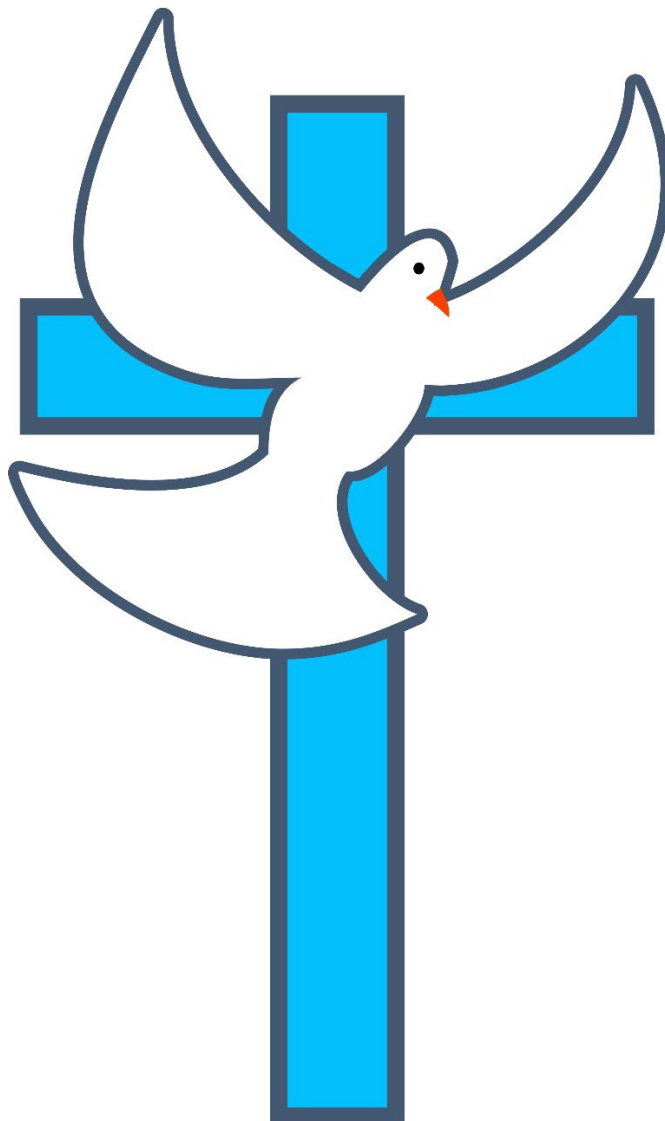

Pastor's Corner

January 2026

New Year. New Opportunities. New Creation.

The turning of the calendar has a way of making us take stock. Some of us feel energized—fresh pages, fresh plans, fresh motivation. Others feel the ache of what didn't get done, what didn't change, what couldn't be fixed. And for many, January is a mixed bag: hope and hesitation, expectation and exhaustion, all living in the same heart.

So I want to offer a word that is deeper than “do better” and sturdier than a New Year's resolution:

“So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new!” (2 Corinthians 5:17, NRSVue)

That verse doesn't describe a minor upgrade. It announces a *new reality*. In Christ, God doesn't merely encourage us to try harder—God begins to *re-make us*. And that matters, because many of us already know this: some things cannot be repaired by willpower. Some burdens don't lift because we finally “got our act together.” Some fear doesn't disappear because we repeated a phrase to ourselves.

But the gospel is not the story of what we can accomplish with enough effort. The gospel is the story of what God does in Jesus—creating life where we had none, hope where we had little, and love where we were running dry.

That's why our congregational Purpose is more than a slogan. It's a confession of faith:

Purpose: “Renewed in Jesus, released for love.”

Renewed. Not just improved. Not just polished. Renewed—because Jesus doesn't patch us up and send us back out unchanged. He forgives. He heals. He re-centers. He reshapes. He keeps working on us, patiently, persistently, tenderly—making us more fully alive.

And then—released. Which means the gospel does something powerful: it loosens what has clenched our lives. Fear. Guilt. Old stories we've told ourselves for decades. The pressure to prove ourselves. The ache of being unseen. The worry that we'll never belong. In Christ, we are released—not into laziness, but into freedom.

And freedom has a direction: **for love**. Not love as a vague feeling, but love with hands and feet. Love that listens. Love that welcomes. Love that shows up. Love that offers practical care, honest friendship, and steady prayer.

From that Purpose flows our Mission:

Mission: “Gather, Grow, Go: Sharing Jesus' Love with All.”

In January, this rhythm matters more than ever.

- **Gather:** We come together because worship is not a religious chore—it's where God does His work on us. Word and Sacrament aren't symbolic pep talks. They are God's living gifts that meet real people in real life.
- **Grow:** Not everyone grows the same way or at the same pace. But we do grow—through study, service, fellowship, prayer, and the everyday shaping of the Spirit. Growth often looks like small steps: a new habit of prayer, a deeper patience, a softened resentment, a renewed courage to serve.
- **Go:** We don't gather just to stay comfortable. We go because Jesus sends us—especially into the very places where people are quietly longing for connection, belonging, purpose, and hope. And yes, that includes right here in **Savannah Lakes Village** and beyond.

And it's all held within our Vision:

Vision: "Community, Renewed by Grace, Alive in Jesus' Hope."

Hope is not denial. Hope doesn't pretend life is easy. Christian hope is grounded in what Jesus has already done—and what Jesus is still doing. That's why hope can live alongside grief. That's why hope can stand up inside uncertainty. That's why hope can still breathe even when we feel like we're starting over again.

And then come our Core Values—anchors for who we are and how we live:

- **Jesus at the Center:** Everything flows from Him. Not our preferences, not our nostalgia, not our anxiety—Jesus.
- **Compassionate Love for Neighbor:** Real grace always moves outward. No strings attached. No scorekeeping.
- **Faithful Stewardship:** Time, talents, treasures—gifts to be used wisely, joyfully, and generously.
- **Life-Giving Community:** A church family marked by warmth, respect, encouragement, and genuine care.

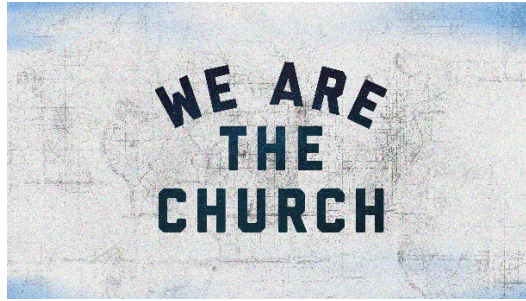
Here's why I think this is especially timely for January in our community: life transitions are real. Retirement. Relocation. Downsizing. Loss. New health challenges. New seasons of loneliness—or the sudden awareness that "busy" isn't the same as "connected." Many arrive here with excitement and also with a quiet question: *Where do I fit now? What am I for now?*

In Christ, you are never reduced to a stage of life. You are never "past your prime" in the kingdom of God. The Lord is still renewing people. Still calling people. Still releasing people—for love.

So as this New Year begins, here's a simple prayer to carry with you:

Lord Jesus, renew me. Release me. Make me new. And send me—gently and boldly—to love in Your name. Amen.

What Is Shepherding Care?

Shepherding Care is a ministry at Lutheran Church By The Lake that combines the **Pastoral Care** of Pastor Greg combined with lay leaders of the congregation who have volunteered to assist him by providing **Coordination of Requests**, (*Sherri Kumle*) and Caring Leadership in **Eucharistic Visits and Calls** (*Candy Zimmerman*), **Prayers** (*Julie Crane*), and **Cards** (*Denise Uitto*).

Should I Connect with Shepherding Care?

Everyone in the congregation is invited to connect with Shepherding Care for themselves, a loved one, or in some cases neighbors and friends if there is a need for prayer. Although prayer is always available for all those in need, Calls, visits, and cards are primarily for the people of Lutheran Church By The Lake.

Why Not Just Make a Request in Person to Pastor or A Lay Leader?

Mentioning needs is always appropriate; however, to ensure that the request is recorded and that your wishes are fulfilled, making a request through Shepherding Care is also recommended.

Invitation to Serve as an Offering Counter

"Everything comes from you, and we have given you only what comes from your hand."— 1 Chronicles 29:14

Dear Friend in Christ,

When the ushers bring forward our Sunday offerings, the visible moment ends—but a sacred, unseen ministry has only begun. **Offering counters** safeguard every gift the congregation entrusts to God's work, turning loose coins, checks, and digital receipts into a clear witness of integrity and gratitude.

What Does a Counter Do?

Pray first, count second. Each session opens with thanksgiving that *all* we receive flows first from God (James 1:17).

Serve in pairs. Two **unrelated volunteer members** work together for about one hour, following our step-by-step count-sheet procedure.

Verify & document. Using dual tallies, endorsement stamps, and signatures, counters create the audit trail that protects donors and the church alike.

Flexible Ways to Serve

Month-at-a-time rotation: Volunteers count for a month usually on a Monday or Tuesday.

We are flexible and build each schedule around travel plans and family commitments—service that fits real lives.

Why This Ministry Matters

Trust & Transparency — Internal controls are not about money for money's sake; they are how we honor the generosity of God's people and keep the community's confidence strong (2 Cor 8:20-21).

Strength for Ministry — Accurate counting frees council leaders, ministry teams, and *Pastor Greg* to focus on mission, teaching, and care rather than troubleshooting numbers (Eph 4:12).

Participation in God's Giving Nature — God does not *need* our offerings; instead, giving shapes us into Christ-like givers. By treating every dollar prayerfully and carefully, counters model the joyful stewardship Paul commends (2 Cor 9:6-8).

Quiet Discipleship — Like the temple gatekeepers in 1 Chronicles 26, counters work behind the scenes, yet their faithfulness undergirds every baptism, Bible study, and act of compassion funded by those gifts.

Is God Nudging You?

Do you value accuracy, confidentiality, and teamwork?

Are you looking for a low-visibility, high-impact way to bless the body of Christ?

Would you enjoy beginning a brief weekly task with prayer and ending it knowing the saints are equipped for ministry?

If so, the Offering Counter Team may be your Spirit-given niche. Training, written checklists, and supportive partners make the learning curve gentle—no accounting degree required!

Please pray about joining us. We are in the process of registering counters for 2026. To explore further or to sign up for the rotation that suits you, reach out to **Eileen Hurlbut, Financial Secretary**, utilizing one of the contact methods listed below. We would love to welcome you into this ministry where attention to detail becomes an act of worship, and every recorded dollar testifies: "*The earth is the Lord's, and everything in it*" (Psalm 24:1).

Thank you for considering this vital service. May the God who "richly provides us with everything for our enjoyment" (1 Tim 6:17) guide your discernment and bless the work of your hands.

How To Get Your Group Info to church members and the wider SLV Community

Miscommunication is a problem for everyone. There are 4 methods to get your announcements out to our church members and also those within the SLV community.

Sunday Bulletin: Our bulletin is printed each Wednesday for the upcoming Sunday. Please email your announcement to the church office by **noon on Tuesdays**. We will then print your information in the bulletin. Please write out exactly how you want it stated in the bulletin and instruct the office that you want it placed in the Sunday bulletin

Realm Email “Blast”: If you would like to see your announcement sent via email , again, write out exactly how you want it stated in the email and instruct the office that you want an email sent out through Realm and what date you would like to have it sent. Please allow the office staff enough time to prepare the email for distribution. It usually takes us an hour to turn it around.

Monthly Newsletter: Please email your announcement/news exactly how you want it printed in the newsletter. **Deadline for submissions is the 19th of the month** for the next month’s newsletter. Again, instruct the office that you are submitting this item for the Newsletter.

SLV NeighborLink: If you would like to see your announcement in NeighborLink, write out exactly how you want it stated in an email and submit to either the Council President or Pastor Greg for approval. They will then send your approved announcement to the office. Please allow all involved enough time to prepare your announcement for submission to NeighborLink. Please inform the Council President or Pastor Greg the dates you want the submission to run. Also make yourself aware of the guidelines involved in a NeighborLink submission.
